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OAKRIDGE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

San Bernard Electric Co-op Fire Dept. Training

Texas Co-op Power magazine had a wonderful article in their October 2019 issue "First On The Scene" discussing the importance of electric cooperatives and VFDs in Texas working together to better the quality of life for all Texans in rural areas. This article written by Eric W. Pohl of Pedernales EC stated "Small towns and unincorporated areas depend on volunteer fire departments. In rural areas, VFDs provide the <u>only</u> available fire and emergency medical responders. According to the State Firefighters & Fire Marshals' Association of Texas, 77% of the fire departments in Texas are composed of all-volunteer crews".

The article went on to provide some other vital news, "Most VFDs are nonprofits and receive little funding from local taxes, relying instead on individual donors and community fundraising". Many people in rural areas have a notion that their property taxes cover the expenses for their local VFD and that is not the case at all. The amount received by each VFD each year from Colorado County varies by the County's budgeted amount for any given year. In 2019, Oakridge VFD received \$6,500 from Colorado County which only accounted for approximately 12% of OVFD's 2019 operating costs. Remember, OVFD is a 100% volunteer crew consisting of men and women who grew up with the virtues of putting others first, being involved in the community and serving their neighbors.

A training session hosted by SBEC on November 13, 2019 was attended by OVFD. SBEC provided training in the areas of the effects and damage of downed power lines, how to avoid downed power lines, the handling of burning transformers, the equipment used for safety measures, and included a live demonstration of the force and potential dangers of coming in contact with downed power lines and how to react properly to these events. Training also included proper responses involving a vehicular accident in conjunction with downed power lines. A VFD's on-going training and knowledge is critical to the safety of electric crews, as well as the safety of local families and businesses throughout our county. OVFD has always had the strong commitment to continued training for all its personnel.

Know our equipment!

OVFD Command Unit ("1063" to us at OVFD) - pictured to the right. 1063 is a multifunctional vehicle: 1) Command Unit for officer in charge at scene of fire; 2) Rehabilitation unit at scene of fire for firefighters to rest, have their vitals taken and receive nutrition and 3) acts as an EMS vehicle dispatched to medical calls. This apparatus has a generator to light up a scene, contains a canopy and chairs for rehab, stretchers to transport patients, medical supply bag and an AED (automated external defibrillator) for cardiac patients.

TPWD/ORWMA TEXAS YOUTH HUNT

The Oakridge Ranch Wildlife Management Association (ORWMA) hosted a Texas Youth Hunt this past November 15–17. The Texas Youth Hunting Program (TYHP) was formed with the Texas Wildlife Association and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1996 to provide opportunities for youth to participate in hunting activities safely, legally, and ethically, while learning about the role landowners and hunters play in wildlife conservation.

The entire Oakridge community came together to support the event. So many people donated their time, talent, & treasure to make this event happen. Oakridge Ranch people donated food, money, deer blinds, their time to set up, tear down, clean up, sight-in guns, help skin deer, make hog sausage, and cooks who made hot dogs and hamburgers Friday night, bacon, eggs, & sausage Saturday morning, barbequed brisket and sausage Saturday night (and don't forget all those desserts) and pancakes on Sunday morning.

Seventeen youth hunters, ages 9 to 17 along with their guardians and 4 hunt masters showed up Friday afternoon. They set up their tents and then went to sight in their rifles. A couple of Moms hunted with their sons and some Dads hunted with their daughters. There were parents as well as youths that had never hunted before. A total of 16 deer, 1 hog, and 1 fox were taken. Everyone had a great time! As the hunters left Sunday morning, one young hunter (maybe 9 or 10 years old) who harvested a deer came up to shake the landowner's hand and tell him thanks for the opportunity to hunt and take a deer. The landowner got a lump in his throat and it was all he could do to smile and nod his head.

In Remembrance of James F. Trickett 1939—2019



Jim Trickett was the first President of the Oak Ridge Improvement Association (ORIA) when the development was turned over to the property owners in the year 2000. Jim provided the leadership and guidance we needed to get our association up and running. He instituted vital organizational policies and procedures that we still follow today.

Jim sent out an email to landowners in 2008 drawing the community together in buying a 2 acre plot in the center of Oakridge Ranch. He led the way in purchasing that property to build a community center for the betterment of our community.

Jim volunteered in his "retirement" with TPWD and worked with TOWMA as Vice-Chairman setting up wildlife management areas. He was also instrumental in the formation of ORWMA, Oakridge's own wildlife management association. Jim led our WMA in working to receive the Lone Star Land Steward award from TPWD. Additionally, he and Carolyn have organized and hosted the deer census for ORWMA every August for 20 years, providing vital documentation to TPWD regarding our deer herd in Oakridge Ranch.

Jim worked with many of our neighbors and ORWMA to host the Oakridge Ranch Annual Wounded Warrior Hunt Weekend for several years. Working closely with Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, wounded soldiers would come to Oakridge and stay with landowners, hunt deer & hogs, fish and generally be loved on and fed well by our community for an entire weekend.

He was dedicated to his community and enjoyed living at Oakridge Ranch. Jim endeavored to help Oakridge become a safe peaceful place to live, a vibrant place....a place we could all call "home". Jim served his neighbors and extended community with honor and we are thankful

he was our neighbor. Well done, Jim! All of Oakridge will miss you!

"When I first transferred to Colorado County in 2002, one of the first people I met was Jim Trickett. He was a leader in developing the Oakridge Wildlife Management Association. Professionally, I was very proud to know Jim and privileged to work with him in the development of the wildlife management associations and antler restrictions that have spread across the state and changed hunting in a very positive manner.
